<b>9</b>	<b>The Park</b>		
<b>a</b>	Southern Boundary (Eastern Low Wall) - Need to re-clear the smaller shrubs/ trees. Still intend to investigate the possibility of pulling larger trees down, into wild copse area (winter activity). Will tackle smaller tree first.  Work pack for the required repairs has been produced. Document still needs reviewing by all trustees before sending information off.		All
<b>b</b>	Allotment – Path has been improved and wood-chipped. Need to discuss planting of wildflowers and managing of the back half.  Still to purchase "whips", probably Blackthorn or similar, for a new hedge along the boundary wall.		All
<b>c</b>	Paths - Rain, Problem with heavy downpours or prolonged rainfall, where water runs along the two main cross paths and then down the western steps, washing them away. Culverts cut under the new woodchip don't work. Agreed to initially look at cutting a dip into the paths at certain points to direct the water down the slope. No further action taken yet. Need to consider long term solution for the western steps.		RB

Possible opportunity for funding and potential for improved police surveillance. PC to write back with our thanks for the visit. ## **APPENDIX 1**

### **LIQUORICE PARK MILLENNIUM GREEN TRUST**

The Lincoln Conservation Volunteers attended on 1<sup>st</sup> June. They tidied the dead hedge in the allotment and also dug out and put down wood chip on the new circular path. Some volunteers pulled hogweed and others trimmed back brambles along paths. They will be coming again in early October to thin out the copses and tidy up dead hedges.

Volunteer numbers fluctuate but on average are much the same. There is always interest shown in volunteering and appreciation received from park users.

The morale is good and new volunteers are always given a very warm welcome. The long spell of dry weather followed by rain has made everything grow and it is an ongoing battle to keep the pathways clear. With the open day in a few weeks, extra effort is being put into ensuring the park is in the best condition as possible.

A tool list needs to be compiled as the purchase of some new equipment needs to be considered, especially loppers and shears.

The partnership with The Network is still proving to be very worthwhile as two young people have now found work.

Several new volunteers have attended but as they are young in work and in some cases have families, regular attendance is not always possible.

The keen core regulars are working hard and are committed.
